Advocating Change Together (ACT) builds knowledge and creates leadership by bringing people with disabilities and their allies together to learn how to share power and work together for social change. ACT connects people to the history of the self-advocacy movement and to the broader disability rights and civil rights movements. The ACT method validates people for who they are, breaks down isolation by revealing common experiences, builds a sense of self-worth, and helps people find common ground from which to organize for change. This program provides opportunities for individuals and groups from North Dakota, Wisconsin, and Minnesota to work together, with the long-term goal of establishing a regional network of persons with disabilities that can organize on issues of disability, employment, housing, transportation and poverty.
